This week, Museum Stories is about bright swirling colors! Take a few minutes to watch the short video.

**LOOK**

Does the title of this painting, *Still Life with Onion Rolls*, make you think of yummy food at Thanksgiving? What tasty thing do you like to eat with your family? Do you see a roll or bread in this painting?

The artist, Michael Goldberg, painted an abstract painting. This means he did not paint things as they look in real life; instead, he used his imagination and focused on colors and shapes. What colors and shapes do you see in this painting? Does this look like a messy table after Thanksgiving dinner? Use your imagination and describe what you see in this painting.

**READ**

Our story this week is *10 Fat Turkeys* by Tony Johnston. This book teaches children to count backwards through the use of a silly rhyming story. Children will love the hilarious story about ten goofy turkeys and their silly antics: swinging from a vine, strutting on a boar, doing a noodle dance and more. It's a story they'll want to hear over and over again! If you don't have this book, take a few minutes to go read another story.

**MAKE**

Follow along with the video to make your own turkey with handprints.
