

ART HISTORY

FROM MOUNT FUJI TO GIVERNY: JAPANESE ART HISTORY AND EUROPEAN IMPRESSIONISM

This course covers the art history of Japan from ancient times as well as the inspirational role that Japanese art history played in the works of European Impressionists and Post-Impressionists like Claude Monet and Vincent van Gogh. The unique art of the tea ceremony and the traditions of Japanese gardens will also be considered. From the flamboyant castles of the shoguns to the quiet forest cottages of tea masters, Japanese art is full of contrasts. Folding screens with images of bamboo forests and tigers will be included, as will tranquil paintings of pine forests and dancing cranes. The ukiyo-e woodblock prints will be examined both within their own culture and as an inspiration to artists like Monet, who designed his beloved gardens at Giverny along Japanese principles, and van Gogh, who said, "All my work is based to some extent on Japanese art."

ENVIRONMENTS IN ART HISTORY

Chris Fasolino

This course will explore how artists throughout history have drawn inspiration from natural environments. It will also explore the kind of environments that artists have designed themselves, from classical villas to Chinese pavilions to Monet's gardens at Giverny. We will begin with the archaeological sites and camel caravans of ancient Mesopotamia. An exploration of classical sites like Pompeii will be followed by the mysterious landscapes of Italian Renaissance masters like Leonardo da Vinci. After a brief look at environments in East Asian art, we will view artifacts and ruins from Amazon rain forest and the Andes Mountains, learning about the Inca Empire, as well as the Canari and other South American peoples. The use of art to re-imagine historical environments will also be considered, including a look at how adventurous painters of the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries sought to convey the epic sweep of history.

IN SEARCH OF CAMELOT: THE PRE-RAPHAELITES AND THEIR WORLD

This course has been designed to accompany the Victorian Radicals exhibition at the Museum. We will explore the colorful beauty and the chivalrous ideals of the Pre-Raphaelite paintings, as well as the artists' eccentric personalities and lives. We will view paintings of courageous knights and noble ladies, reflecting these nineteenth-century artists' fascination with the history and legends of the Middle Ages. We will also look at Scottish Highland scenes, pastoral English landscapes, and Dickensian slice-of-life images, contrasted with exotic glimpses of Cairo and Jerusalem that reflect the travels and real-life adventures of Pre-Raphaelite artists. The Arts and Crafts movement, with its efforts to restore the individuality and creativity of traditional craftsmanship, will also be included. Beautiful work in silver, stained glass, and other media, as well as important and historic paintings, will be considered in person as we explore the Museum's exciting new exhibition together.

ART HISTORY: THE ANCIENT WORLD THROUGH THE MIDDLE AGES

In this course, we will explore the art history of the ancient world, beginning with the bold mariners who sailed the wine-dark sea and inspired Homer's *Odyssey*, the Stoic warriors who built the Mycenaean citadels, and the art and architecture of Athens and classical Greece. We will then see how the earth shook as Alexander the Great charged forth to conquer, leading to a fusion of artistic traditions and cultures. The rise of Rome as a world power is next, as we explore the cities lost to the eruption of Mount Vesuvius and the palaces and forums built by emperors. Next, the medieval world of castles, cathedrals, and illuminated manuscripts will be considered, as well as the art of the Silk Road. The course concludes with the rediscovery of ancient artistic techniques that marked the birth of the Italian Renaissance.

The ancient practice of Qigong includes gentle movement, self-massage, visualization, breath work, and balance. Using these elements we work on cultivating life energy, or qi, in our bodies, bringing vitality and health to mind, body, and spirit. Qigong is from Traditional Chinese Medicine and has been used for centuries as a health-enhancing, energy-building practice appropriate for all ages. Qigong is typically practiced standing but can easily be done while seated. No special equipment or supplies are needed. Demonstrations will be given covering each individual element of the face, and students will learn the interesting tricks that make an appealing portrait. Focus will be on color mixing and getting a good likeness of the subject, and discovering how exciting and satisfying portrait painting can be.
